



NRW Scholarship Program 2019 for students from Jordan

Guide: How to apply

1. Read the **Call for applications** thoroughly. Check if you fulfill the **general prerequisites** for applying to the Program:
 - a. Are you a **student** enrolled in a **master's** degree or **PhD** program at one of the following Jordanian universities¹?
 - i. German-Jordanian University
 - ii. University of Jordan Amman
 - iii. Yarmouk University in Irbid
 - iv. Jordan University of Science and Technology in Irbid
 - v. Mu'tah University in Karak
 - vi. Al Al-Bayt University in Mafraq
 - b. Do you speak **English**² and/or German fluently?
2. If you fulfill the general prerequisites, have a look at the **list of scholarship places** 2019. Check the places offered with regard to the following aspects:
 - a. Does the place offered match your **academic specialization** (subjects/disciplines & focal areas of research)?
 - b. Do the indicated requirements of the scholarship place match your **qualification** (master / PhD)?
 - c. Is the **time frame** indicated consistent with the schedule of your study program / time planning?
3. Taking into consideration the mentioned aspects, please **select** up to 3 **scholarship places** offered and
 - a. Indicate them in the **application form** according to your priorities.

4. Kindly complete the entire **online application form** and submit it also via online.
 - At the online application form, the fields marked with red stars are mandatory and have to be completed.

5. Please also enclose via online the following additional **application documents** (also listed in the online application form)
 - a. Your **CV (+ portrait photo)**
 - b. documentary evidence on your **previous academic achievements**, such as:
 - i. transcript of records
 - ii. certificates of previous degrees
 - c. **Letter of motivation**: containing statements on:
 - i. your particular interests and specialization
 - ii. academic aims and prospective professional career
 - iii. your expectations with regard to your stay in North Rhine-Westphalia as a scholar and the knowledge you seek to acquire during the scholarship
 - d. two **letters of reference** from two different university lecturers
 - i. including full & valid contact details and email addresses – please use the **form** provided for each of the letters
 - ii. the references need to include statements on the applicant's general qualification, previous progress of studies, further course of the studies, objectives of the bachelor's or master's thesis and English language skills
Please note: letters of reference should not be older than six months!
 - e. **optional documents**: You may optionally provide evidence on further qualifications which are relevant to the scholarship program or the place you apply for (e.g.: evidence on language skills; certificates on other relevant qualifications; participation certificates for relevant trainings/congresses etc.)
 - f. **Please note**:
 - i. *All application documents must be submitted in English (or German)!*
 - ii. *Please submit all certificates, references and your CV in pdf-format.*
 - iii. *Official documents, transcripts, letters of reference etc. must be signed and stamped (or written on official letter paper) by the issuing institution.*

6. Finally, please submit all application documents **until 28th of February 2019!**
